The Formula Summit - Indianapolis

I attended a Formula Training Summit in Indianapolis on September 23rd to 25th. The Summit meeting was for Kiwanians from all across the United States, Canada, and the Caribbean. The Training from this Summit meeting was informative, educational and inspiring.

One of the main goals of this Summit Training was to 'HELP' each District develop their own Game Plan to further enhance the Kiwanis experience in order to add New Clubs and strengthen existing clubs.

The Formula is a member-led, multi-year initiative that focuses on Kiwanis members. This training in Indianapolis concentrated on the importance of each District developing its own Game Plan. One of the simple premises is based on the idea of when you love something—you want to share it and live it your entire life. Our Formula Chair is Missy Zimmerman with Past Governor Scott Zimmerman serving a vice chair.

Our Summit began on Friday September 23rd with Michael Frailey, Chair, The Formula-Americas, thanking Kiwanians for volunteering their most precious asset—their time---to improving the world one child and community at a time.



Some of the metrics that he shared with us are: Membership high of 324.727 was in 1992. Since then we have lost about 125,000 members or about 39% of our members. We are about 199,000 members for 2016. This was about what our membership was in 1951. We lose about 3% of our members annually. With this in mind, we lose 52% of those in the dreaded September Purge. Good news— on average we opened 157 clubs a year. Bad news on average we close 272 clubs. 72% of our Kiwanis revenue comes from dues. Average age of male member is 61 and 56 for female.

These are sobering statistics. Not unlike other civic clubs but these are our figures and we must work through it. With these figures in mind, the formula summit concentrated on "Game Planning" for our Districts.

Three of our Goals were: #1 New Clubs opening. International President Jane Erickson gave each District her goals and our Capital District goals for Governor Kelly and her leadership Team is 7 new clubs from October 1st 2016 to September 30th 2017. This is a huge goal since we have opened 3 new clubs in 3 years.

- **#2** Recruit and Train Club Openers and Club Coaches (or Counselors) for each Division in our Capital District.
- #3 Build a New Club in the first 60 days of the administration year—meaning in October & November.

 Needless to say this is a monumental task but one we can strive for President Jane and Governor Kelly.

President Jane also spoke of her 2016-17 recognition program (formerly known as distinguished) for Kiwanis

Kiwanis Club Member Bob Kerlinger traveled to Mongolia to join the new members in attending the Poquoson meeting via Skype video and Kiwanis International immediate past president Sue Petrisin attended from New Jersey by FaceTime.

Kiwanis Governor Kelly Boswell, Southeast Region Trustee Judy Pantelides, Lt Governor Caren Schumacher, and past Governor Scott Zimmerman, members of the Gloucester and Hampton Kiwanis Clubs, and several other guests attended in person and enjoyed breakfast while participating in the ceremonies.

After introductions and remarks by distinguished guests, Bob Kerlinger inducted the Mongolians in English while one of the new members translated into the local dialect. Bob pointed out the eventual goal is to form a separate Kiwanis club, which would be the very first in Mongolia.

Arima Marder, a native of Mongolia and a Poquoson club member, initiated a club project in 2012 to collect clothing and supplies for two orphanages in Ulaanbaatar to help school children get the most from their education. This was the inspiration for the establishment of a satellite there. At Tuesday's meeting Arima translated local guests' remarks into Mongolian for the benefit of the new members.

In her concluding remarks, Past International President Ms. Petrisin said she "had goosebumps" watching Kiwanis history in the making.

At French restaurants, service is included in the price of your meal. If you're particularly pleased with service, leave a few coins on the table. The same goes for taxis.

MANY COUNTRIES, ONE CURRENCY

The euro is the currency in France and in most European countries. That helps simplify currency exchange. Different countries have different designs, so collect them all—they circulate throughout the European Union.

DELICIOUSLY DIVERSE CUISINE

Each French region boasts a distinctive cuisine Wine sauces and snails in Burgundy. Buckwheat crêpes and seafood in Brittany. Sauerkraut dishes in Alsace. Cheese fondue in the Alps. Tomato and garlic-based dishes in Provence. And that's just to name a few!

THE IRON LADY SPARKLES

The Eiffel Tower is the most-visited paid monument in the world. Its 20,000 lights flash during the first five minutes of each hour after nightfall until 2 a.m. in the summer and 1 a.m. in the winter.

NUMBER ONE

France is the world's top tourist destination, with 83 million foreign tourists annually.

ONE LANGUAGE

French is the official language of France, but regional languages are also spoken, such as Germanic dialects (Alsatian), Celtic languages (Breton), and other Gallo-Roman languages (Langues d'Oïl, Occitan).
